Dear Families,

It seems a long time ago now, but we hope that you did have a wonderful break and wish that 2024 is a happy and successful year for all in the EJS family and community.

There are lots of exciting developments for the school to look forward to in coming weeks and months. A few reminders

The school day starts at 8.45 am every day with the register taken just a few minutes later. Please try hard to get your child to school for this time to avoid missing the beginning and lots of information sharing about the day ahead. Whilst we definitely prefer children to be in school if a little late rather than not at all, it would be good to welcome everyone to the school day at the same time.

Please make sure that when travelling to and from school by car you follow parking and road laws and restrictions, so that all in the community remain safe.

Thank you for your understanding when we had to close the school. Despite all efforts by staff, including the kitchen team, the break in our gas supply meant we had no hot water, heating or ability to cook on the school site. With the water main bursting just outside the school before Christmas, and now the gas, we are buying lots of batteries – just in case!

Autumn Attendance

Thank you to all the parents and carers who have supported us this year so far with making sure their child is at school more than 95% of the time and that they are on time each day. You are making sure that your child doesn't miss out on important learning experiences throughout the year.

Thank you also to those parents who have improved their child's attendance following a letter/meeting to say that their child was at risk of being persistently absent – the efforts you've made are really appreciated. Above are our Autumn Term awards attendance awards, they are given for each term - therefore every child has the potential to achieve 95% or better each term. Attendance is important because statistics show that pupils with good attendance have higher attainment in school. Studies also show that children with attendance above 95% make better progress socially as well as academically. With the focus and development on the curriculum that has taken place at school then children who are absent will find gaps in their sequential knowledge.

The table below demonstrates how much school children miss if they are absent and it is surprising how this adds up. We are fully aware that children get ill and these are mainly responsible and unavoidable for the majority of absences. The aim of this is the positive promotion of attendance for all so please no holiday requests or days of for birthdays etc.

Story Stomp – fun session for 2 to 4-yearolds and their parents and carers to follow on from Rhyme Time



Attendance

The Supreme Court reached a decision in which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so.

As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996. Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006.

When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law.

Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application.


Year Six Sketching

Having High Expectations

The expectation around what children need to be achieving in their writing is very high. The curriculum is looking for every child to be a successful independent writer in many different styles before they start secondary school Here's an example, Year 4s are finding the writing features they need to use to describe the young witch, Mildred Hubble, from the Worst Witch series. They will then go on to use these in their own work when the write independetly

Proposed Academy Conversion

The education landscape is changing, as evidenced by the many schools in Warwickshire that have already converted to academy status or are currently considering this adjustment. Local Authorities are especially finding it harder to provide personalised support to individual schools due the pull on their reduced budgets.

In the last few years due to low numbers entering our infant feeder school, with the option to go to the many other schools in the local area, we have struggled to have full classes, and in some years we have to mix age groups. With more children comes financial sustainability, and this secures stability for you and your children.

For these reasons, Exhall Junior School's Governing Body and the school's Senior Leadership Team have been exploring the possibility of converting to academy status, looking carefully into the benefits for your children and the community.

The governors and school leadership team believe that conversion to an academy and joining an established Trust will offer many advantages and opportunities whilst ensuring that the values of our school, and its community, remain. In the upcoming weeks we will be sharing with you the options open to us.
