Governors

Office Requests

If you have changed your contact details over the summer holiday, email, telephone or home address that you let the school office know so that if and when we need to get hold of you, we can do successfully.

We ask that you ensure that your Pay360 accounts are up to date and not in arrears. Your account can be set up to alert you of low balances to ensure that a debt doesn't occur. Unpaid meal debts will be followed up and if your account is in arrears of more than £7.50, we will ask that your child brings a packed lunch until the debt is cleared. Here's the link Pay360

For safeguarding and security reasons, it is best to restrict access to school premises during the student's lunchtime – from 12.00 to 1.00, unless you have an appointment or an emergency. Thank you in advance for your cooperation with this; your children's safety is of paramount importance to us.

School Meals

Educaterers have sent us the following regarding a small increase in School Meal costs which are now £2.30

"We have worked incredibly hard to ensure that we are keeping the increases to the absolute minimum whilst enabling us to continue our commitment to locally sourcing and offering the best quality you expect and deserve in our menus and hope you will understand the necessity for this small increase."



Did you know that just registering your child for Free School Meals means that the school gets extra money?

What you may not know however is that the Government gives money to schools to help children from lower income families do their very best. This funding is called a 'Pupil Premium'.

For every child registered at Exhall Juniors, the school will receive additional money.

With this money we can provide more interventions to accelerate children's academic progress as well as interventions to develop self-esteem, self-confidence and social emotional skills. If your application is successful, not only will it mean your child will receive a free school meal but we can also help in these other areas as well.

We are introducing a new procedure to deal with unnamed lost property in school. Every Friday a table will be laid out in the hall with lost property for students to come and check. If it has not been collected by the following Friday it will then be recycled.

Unfortunately, due to lack of storage space, we cannot store it for a longer period. Anything named is returned to students as soon as we receive it. You can come in at any time to check through.



Despite yearly requests by ourselves, the whole secondary school process isn't one that we have any input into, and we often only hear secondhand details about Open Evenings etc. We would encourage you to visit as many secondary schools as you can so as to inform your decision, and ask lots of questions when you are there.

The application process opened on 1 September 2022 and the deadline to apply for a secondary school place is 31 October 2022. If you apply by this date, you will receive your child's school offer on National Offer Day (1 March 2023).

Late applications won't be processed until after 1 March 2023, by which time many schools will be full and you are much less likely to be offered a place at your preferred school. When contacting Admissions, we would you suggest that you email, as there are often long queues if you phone


